If you order one online, make sure it is at least 220v.

I have been teaching the art of faceting at the Tuesday night workshops. So far several of our club members have learnt to cut stones. It is a one on one teaching process, and cutting a stone can take up to 4 weeks of workshop evenings.

Scottish Green Stone has a deep connection to both


Mother Earth and to the world of the Fae and is an ideal stone to connect to the Faerie world.
